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More than a half a century after her graduation in 1961, alumnae **Sharon Esterley**, shares what Claremont High School was like when her class ruled the campus.

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Throughout the years, Claremont High School has evolved into a center of growth and technology. However, it seems like the generations in the past and the generation in the present have some things in common. Alumnae **Sharon Esterley** elaborates on how the former high school used to be and how the alumni strive to impact more than just the city of Claremont.

Yearbook: What years did you attend Claremont High School?

Sharon Esterley: I attended 9th grade at El Roble since 9th was originally a middle school grade level, and 10-12th grade at CHS and I graduated in 1961.

YBK: What were the students and school activities like in 1961?

SE: We had the usual cliques: the jocks, the brains, the social, the nerds who turned out to be the smartest! As for the cultural cliques, there were no African-American or Asian students at CHS back then. There were some Hispanic students and there was no overt discrimination but not lots of social mixing, except in sports. We were the last class to complete all our high school years at the old high school building. We loved it! With only 600 or so students, everyone pretty much knew everyone else. Halls bustled between classes, boys kept cherry-bombing the toilets in the upstairs boys' restroom, girls sneaked smokes in the girls' room.

We wore bangs and big full skirts & lots of petticoats, very little makeup, flat shoes. Girls always wore skirts & blouses to school, never pants or shorts. Boys wore rolled-up jeans or khakis, letter sweaters, flat-top haircuts. We had dances in the gym (now it's the Candlelight Pavilion).

We had a closed campus, so we had to eat lunch in the cafeteria or have picnics on the lawn. There was a tunnel under Foothill from the corner in front of the school that we used to cross the street.

YBK: Were you involved with any clubs or groups on campus?

SE: [I was part of] CSF (California Scholarship Federation), GAA - Girls' Athletic Association, French Club, Drama Club. TOT's (Teachers of Tomorrow), and El Espiritu. And I was the Co-Captain of the Drill Team (the first drill team in CHS history!) None of us had ever been on a drill team before. We had no school band, so we marched at football game halftimes & in parades to the beat of 3 drummers.

YBK: What was your favorite and least favorite part of high school?

SE: I loved all of my friends, activities, great teachers, drivers' ed, dances, and sports. My least favorite was the drama, the trauma & the teenage angst.

SE: Our initial goal is to create a connection with the alumni and to celebrate the Centennial year of CHS with the first All-Alumni Reunion. Now that the Centennial year is almost over, we plan to expand our alumni connections by collecting complete rosters for every graduating class, scanning and uploading to the website all of the yearbooks from 1911 to present day, and encouraging all alumni to log onto the website where they can find each other and participate in alumni activities. Several events during the year will give alumni the chance to get together.

YBK: How was the All-Alumni Reunion? SE: It was a blast! We had alumni attend from the classes of 1941 through 2011! Everyone came in a party mood & were greeted by current students dressed up as if they'd just stepped out of the 1915, 1938 or 1955 yearbook! Susan Brunasso's photo booth saw lots of action as alumni mugged & smooched for the camera, and Wolfie made a grand appearance. Bea Hardy, at 88 years old, Class of '41, was the belle of the ball and "cut a rug" on the dance floor with Mickey Blackburn, Class of '70. The Mediterranean buffet from Casablanca was delicious & beverage service from the Wine Merchant, Hip Kitty & Casablanca gave everyone plenty of choices. Music was provided by the Has Bins & the Seth Greenberg Trio. Historic exhibits told the stories of CHS classes through the decades, with photos of the campus' evolution from its 3-story origins in 1911 to the 2-story "Old School House" to the single-story "new" CHS

YBK: Is there any advice you would like to give the current students?

SE: Take advantage of the opportunities in front of you, value your education, hold your family and friends near and dear, and after graduation, join the Alumni Society!
